

## New Town of Kitty Hawk Police Station Underway



The Town of Kitty Hawk recently purchased the Sentara Medical facility at 5200 N. Croatan Highway in Kitty Hawk. A portion of the building will be repurposed and remodeled to accommodate a larger more functional Police Station. The old surgery center and portions of the North end of the existing building will be demolished with a new lobby style entrance constructed on the North end for the Town's Police Department. The south end will remain medical use and the Town is currently exploring options to reopen the medical portion of the facility. The Town of Kitty Hawk acquired the property for \$4,100,000 and lease revenue for the medical use will offset the cost of this purchase. The cost of a new Police Station on 4 Town owned lots on U.S. 158 was estimated to cost in excess of \$9,500,000.

The Town will begin demolition of portions of the building by the end of year and then begin remodeling to accommodate the Town's Police Department. A ground-breaking ceremony is scheduled for October 28<sup>th</sup> at 11:00 a.m. at 5200 N. Croatan Highway and we invite all our residents to come and celebrate the Town's accomplishments and the Kitty Hawk Police Department.

It is strongly recommend that individuals ages 65+ receive the High Dose Quadrivalent Flu Vaccine this year. Please note that this clinic does NOT administer the High Dose Quadrivalent Flu Vaccine. Individuals ages 65+ may not be fully protected by receiving the Standard-Dose Quadrivalent Vaccine.

Mr Heffner served on the Town's Recreation Committee and was a passionate supporter of Sandy Run Park.



## Halloween Safety Recommendations

The Kitty Hawk Police Department has compiled a list of safety precautions to consider while preparing to celebrate a safe and Happy Halloween:

- Use flame resistant costumes. Make sure all costumes and accessories are made of flame resistant material. Commercially manufactured costumes and accessories should be labeled flame resistant.
- Make sure costumes are brightly colored or at least have reflective markings to make them • visible to motorists. Reflective tape can be used to trim costumes and treat bags.
- Costumes should fit properly to avoid the occasion of tripping and falling. If using a mask, make sure it fits properly and holes large enough for mouth and eyes.
- When using a toy firearm with a costume, make sure the toy gun has an orange tip on the • end of the barrel.
- Have children carry a flashlight while trick or treating.
- Parents should accompany children, especially small children, while they are trick or treat-• ing.
- Give and accept wrapped or packaged candy only.
- Children should only accept treats from people they know.
- Warn children to have an adult examine all treats before they are eaten.

Kitty Hawk Fire Department along with Fire Departments across the country are teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Fire Prevention Week (FPW), October 9-15, 2022. This year's FPW campaign, "Fire won't wait. Plan your escape" works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe from home fires.

Today's homes burn faster than ever. You may have as little as two minutes (or even less time) to safely escape a home fire from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Your ability to get out of a home during a fire depends on early warning from smoke alarms and advance planning.

It's important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape plan. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance, so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is different, every home fire escape plan will also be different. Have a plan for everyone in the home. Children, older adults, and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out. Make sure that someone will help them. Plan Ahead! If a fire breaks out in your home, you may have only a few minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Everyone needs to know what to do and where to go if there is a fire.

### SAFETY TIPS

- MAKE a home escape plan. Draw a map of your home showing all doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your home.
- HAVE an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.
- PRACTICE your home fire drill at night and during the day with everyone in your home, twice a year.
- PRACTICE using different ways out.
- ))) TEACH children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- ))) CLOSE doors behind you as you leave.

#### IF THE ALARM SOUNDS...

- ))) If the smoke alarm sounds, GET OUT AND STAY OUT. Never go back inside for people or pets.
- If you have to escape through smoke, GET LOW AND GO under the smoke to your way out.
- ))) CALL the fire department from outside your home.

### FACTS

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Install smoke alarms inside every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- According to an NFPA survey, only one of every three American households have actually developed and practiced a home fire escape plan.
- While 71% of Americans have an escape plan in case of a fire, only 47% of those have practiced it.
- One-third of American households who made an estimate thought they would have at least 6 minutes before a fire in their home would become life-threatening. The time available is often less. And only 8% said their first thought on hearing a smoke alarm would be to get out!

# Clothes Dryer Fire Safety



As we approach the fall and winter months, clothes dryer fires tend to peak. Approximately 2,900 home clothes dryers are reported each year and cause an estimated 5 deaths, 100 injuries and \$35 million in property loss. Failure to clean the dryer is the leading cause of home dryer fires. Please see the tip sheet below on dryer safety and contact the station if you have any

## Did you know?

You are at higher risk of having a clothes dryer fire if you don't clean your lint filter and dryer vents.

Follow these simple safety tips to prevent a clothes dryer fire in your home.

- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter. Clean the lint filter before and after each cycle.
- Do not forget to clean the back of the dryer where lint can build up.
- Check the venting system behind the dryer to make sure that it is not damaged, crushed or restricted.
- Make sure that the outdoor vent covering opens when the dryer is operating.
