# Town Council Approves 2023-2024 annual budget with no tax increase!

Monday, June 5th the Kitty Hawk Town Council approved the 2023-2024 \$11,519,710 balanced budget.

Town Manager Melody Clopton presented the budget to the Council reviewing some highlighted plans for the coming year including:

- No property tax increase
- No use of restricted funds
- Saving for Capital investments
- Modified vehicle retention policy
- Emergency Management line item
- Contingency funds
- Development and implementation of Town Wide Training & Development Budget

The largest endeavor this year will be the renovation of the Police Department Building. In the same council meeting the Dills Architects contract was approved to move forward with final drawings.

The Town has also entered into a land exchange with Dare County to provide a much needed EMS station, in exchange for the construction of a Fire Bay for our Town's use.

# Town of Kitty Hawk hires new Police Chief!

The Town of Kitty Hawk is pleased to announce Michael Palkovics will join our team as the Town's new Police Chief. He will begin his new role on Wednesday, July 5, 2023, and succeeds Chief Joel C. Johnson, who retired in February.

Chief Palkovics says, "I want to thank Town Manager Melody Clopton and the entire Staff for the opportunity to serve the Town of Kitty Hawk as their next Police Chief. I look forward to meeting with the community, the town leadership team, and the men and women of the Kitty Hawk Police Department and begin taking the agency to the next level of excellence. I am committed to working with everyone in the community and town government to continue providing the excellent service the department is known for while building a strong and comprehensive public safety team for the Town of Kitty Hawk."

Chief Palkovics brings a wealth of policing experience, serving the Henrico County Virginia Police Division, since 1993. He retired in June as a Lieutenant Colonel and second in command over Support Operations for Henrico.

During his tenure, he has been in patrol, field operations, professional standards, internal affairs, community services in the school system, and community policing.

Chief Palkovics holds a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from Old Dominion University. He is a graduate of the 59th Administrative Offices Management Program at North Carolina State University, the Senior Management Institute for Police at Boston University, the 44th Session of the Police Executive Leadership School, FBI LEEDA Trilogy and the Virginia LEEDS program.

Chief Palkovics has received the Leslie T. Sheppard Award in Community Policing, Lifesaving Awards and two Meritorious Unit awards.

# **Police Station Building Update**


At their June meeting, Town Council awarded a contract for construction document development and construction oversight to Dills Architects.

The project includes 7305 renovated square feet and 926 square feet of new construction. The project budget is \$3,856,025

In exchange for the lots, Dare County will construct an adjacent Fire Bay for Town use. The County will provide the Town a 40 year lease for the Fire Bay.

# FIREWORKS SAFETY

Our Fire and Police Departments would like to remind all residents fireworks which deploy into the air are prohibited in the town limits. A few safety reminders if you are around fireworks in use this holiday.

- Never allow young children to handle fireworks, and even older children should be well supervised when using sparklers or other fireworks
- · Personal protective devises should be used such as eye protection
- Never hold fireworks in your hands when lighted
- · Do not use fireworks indoors
- Never point a firework toward people or other individuals
- · Do not attempt to relight a firework which is malfunctioning
- · Keep a hose or a bucket of water nearby if using fireworks
- Never use illegal fireworks

Sparklers are permitted in the Town of Kitty Hawk, but please be aware they can burn at about 2,000 degrees which is hot enough to melt metal. Children should be well supervised when using them to avoid potential serious burns.

Note: Town Hall, Public Works and the Recycling Center will not be open on Tuesday, July 4, 2023.

In June the Kitty Hawk Fire department hosted Olivia Robinson from Ollie's Eyes photography. Oliva has been an amazing story and helped the KHFR with many projects and the whole fire service is a better place for having her here.

Many of us have been around her during classes, training events and fire service outings. Her spirit is infectious and we truly appreciate capturing what KHFR is all about as well as all of her contributions to the Fire Service.



Lt Bradford T Clark, formerly Hanover Fire & EMS

Bradford T. Clark was a Lieutenant with Hanover Fire & EMS who passed away in the line of duty on October 11, 2018. While assisting at a motor vehicle accident he was tragically killed and two other fire fighters were seriously injured due to a collision of a tractor trailer with the fire apparatus on the side of the roadway.

His story has been instrumental in ensuring stricter move over laws in Virginia and nationwide. The North Carolina Move Over Law has been in place since the early 2000's. Failure to change lanes if possible or slow down approaching a roadside incident is punishable by a \$500 fine and court costs.

Lt Bradford was known for teaching every fire fighter in his command, encouraging others to further their education, stay motivated and learn how to become a leader. Meanwhile, he was teaching Olivia and her sisters valuable life lessons which she says carried her through the hardest parts of her llife.

As his daughter Olivia has seen first-hand on multiple occasions just how much of a family the fire service is. She explained, "Firemen stepped up and encouraged me to learn about what my dad did when he was away from home, and that's when Ollie's Eyes photography was born."

She created this business to help capture exactly what these men and women work so hard for. So when they are gone from home, training to better handle situations occurring in the community, their families have a photo, their instructors have an example, and their memory is preserved for a moment in time. Olivia says, "These selfless individuals sacrifice their precious time, to ensure the safety of people they have never met, and I have the privilege of capturing just that."

Our team was thrilled to have her shadow them and record a few great pictures for all of us to enjoy!

It is also a good time to check your in home fire extinguishers too to ensure they are not expired and always make sure your family has an evacuation plan in place as well!




Summer is here and outdoor grilling is underway!

# Stay fire safe this summer! Follow these grilling safety tips.



Only use your grill outside. Keep it at least 3 feet from siding, deck rails and eaves.



Keep a 3-foot safe zone around your grill. This will keep kids and pets safe.



Open your gas grill before lighting.



Keep an eye on your grill, fire pit or patio torches. Don't walk away from them when they are lit.



Clean your grill after each use. This will remove grease that can start a fire.



Place the coals from your grill in a metal can with a lid once they have cooled.

# A reminder from Public Works



Residents and visitors are reminded trash not in the roll out designated can will not be collected.

Please do not place trash around a full can. This is unsightly and could pose a danger to pedestrians and traffic.

Also, roll-out cans must be in good condition. This includes operational wheels and lids.

# No Bulk Item Pick up until September 2023

Residents and visitors are reminded the Town does not collect bulk or large items or vegetative debris from the rights-of-way between May 20th and September 20th.

If you have items to dispose of please take them to the Recycling Center at 4190 Bob Perry Road.

Vegetative debris must be taken to a commercial vendor or the Dare County Landfill.

The town will conduct a vegetative collection in mid-October.

Please contact Dare County Public Works at 252-475-5881 for repair options or to obtain a replacement can.

Please note cans are required to be rolled back to the house within 24 hours of collection.

Please do not place unauthorized debris in a trash can. It will not be collected. This includes wood, metal, and vegetative debris.

Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, e-scooters and e-bikes, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. If not used correctly, or if damaged, these batteries can catch on fire or explode.

### The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

### Safety Tips

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- · Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- · Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- · Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°F (40°C).
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

### Signs of a Problem

Stop using the battery if you notice these problems: odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, or odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call 9-1-1.

### **Battery Disposal**

- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option.
- Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions.
- Do not put discarded batteries in piles.

### Charging an E-bike

Charge your battery in a flat, dry area away from children, direct sunlight, liquids, tripping hazards, and in a location where the e-bike is not at risk of falling.





# Town Recreation Committee Update

The Town of Kitty Hawk Recreation Committee recently held meetings during April and May. The Master Plan updates were among the agenda items, and the committee successfully concluded this process during a special meeting. The committee also addressed various other topics, such as the pump track project, community survey creation, budget, grants, and ongoing concerns. The public is encouraged to attend these meetings, which are posted on the Kitty Hawk town calendar. The next meeting is Tuesday, July 25th at 6:00 pm.

The committee recently celebrated the release of the "Year of the Trail" video showcasing the town's scenic trails and encourages residents and visitors to explore the natural beauty that Kitty Hawk has to offer.

Additionally, committee members actively participated in the recent Local Advisory Committee (LAC) meeting that focused on the Kitty Hawk Woods Reserve and the proposed phase two loop trail project. The committee played a vital role in advocating for the trail project.
